orn in 1962 in Hartford, Connecticut, Suzanne's father was an air force pilot. Her early years sparked an interest in history and the causes and effects of war. She began her writing career working with a team of writers on children's television programs like Clarissa Explains it All and Little Bear. Both of these programs won Emmy Awards.

Spotlight On...

After several years writing for children's television, Suzanne's award-winning author friend challenged her to write children's books. Her Year of the Jungle book tells the story of a child who experiences the effects of war. It is based off her childhood memories. Before writing The Hunger



Games Trilogy, Collins was inspired by Alice in Wonderland to write an award-winning five-part fantasy war series. This series is called *The Underland Chronicles*. It shares the story of Gregor, a kid from New York City. He fails into the Underland, which is inhabited by humans and creatures. Here he undertakes a quest to find his father. Collins' *The Hunger Games* Trilogy appeared on bestseller lists like The New York Times, USA Today and Publishers Weekly. It has been translated into 51 languages. All three books became major motion pictures that broke box office records with *Mockingjay* being split into two movies.

- Because of the popularity of The Hunger Games Trilogy, in 2010, Collins was named one of Time Magazine's most influential people.
- The roots of a katniss plant are edible and Katniss eats some when she is starving.
- There is an Unofficial Hunger Games Cookbook that includes a recipe for groosling soup.
