



#### **Number The Stars**



The Nazis have been occupying Denmark for three years, and Annemarie and her friend Ellen have become quite accustomed to seeing soldiers on every corner. Little sister Kirsti isn't even afraid of them as she cannot remember a time when there were no soldiers.


Annemarie has already suffered tragedy in her life. Three years ago in a traffic accident her beloved eighteen year old sister Lise was killed. Annemarie often peeks into the blue trunk to admire Lise's trousseau, particularly the wedding dress in which she was to have been married just two weeks after her death. Her fiancé Peter Nielson still comes around to visit the younger girls and talk to their parents, but things are just not the same any more.

When the Nazis demand the list of Danish Jews from the rabbis in the synagogue, the underground Resistance movement swings into action and the citizens of Denmark are called upon to hide their Jewish friends and neighbors. Dark-haired Ellen is sent to the Johansen family for shelter, and at this point the tension begins to mount.


Annemarie and Ellen are asleep when Nazi soldiers come looking for Ellen's family, the Rosens. It's difficult for the Johansens to pass off dark haired Ellen as a member of their family, but quick thinking on Mr. Rosen's part saves them all. A trip to the country where Jewish citizens are being smuggled to Sweden continues to raise the level of suspense and carries the novel to its conclusion.

The story of how the Danish people helped their Jewish neighbors to safety consumes the rest of the book. Annemarie and Ellen are called upon to grow up quickly into an understanding far beyond their years. The day to day heroism of Danish citizens in the face of adversity is celebrated at a level in which young people can easily participate.








