



Summary

A Bargain for Frances is a story of two playmates. Frances is sweet, trusting, and a bit gullible. Thelma, her friend, usually gets the best of things. After Thelma persuades Frances to give all her savings for a plastic tea set, Frances wises up. The way Frances persuades Thelma to change her mind on "no backsies" shows her increased savvy. The story ends with a new understanding between the girls.

Initiating Activities

- 1. Post the word BARGAIN in large letters on the door or bulletin board. Discuss the meaning and kinds of bargains.
- 2. This book is about friendship. Discuss kinds of friendships. Students may share ideas with classmates about what is important in a friendship.



- 3. Look at the cover of the book. What clues can you get about the book? List your predictions to check out as you read the book.
- 4. Notice the notice on the cover of the book about the author and illustrator. Why do some books have illustrators and some do not? Try drawing a picture of your own for the final page of the book. Use your imagination and consult your predictions.

- 1. What song does Frances sing on her way home from Thelma's?
- 2. What is Gloria's opinion of the plastic tea set?
- 3. Why is Ida important to the story?
- 4. When Frances looks into the candy store, what does she see?
- 5. What do you think Frances means in the little song she sang walking home from the candy store? What do you think will happen in the rest of the story?

Supplementary Activities

- 1. Authors often use songs or poems in their stories. Russell Hoban included songs in *A Bargain for Frances*. Can you think of any other books you've read with poems or songs? Share these books with your classmates, perhaps reading some of the poems aloud to the rest of the class. See Activity on page 11.
- What do you think Frances's feelings were when she looked in the candy store window and saw Thelma buying the china tea set? Write a short sentence or draw a picture to explain your answer.

Activity Sheet Writing

Write other verses for Frances's songs. Make lists of rhyming words. Students may substitute words and make their own poem.


