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
Prereading Knowledge Chart

Directions: In the space provided, mark each statement true or false based on what you think now. Read the book to see if you are correct. Each question relates to China at the beginning of the twentieth century.

 1. The feet of small girls were bound to correct deformed feet.
 2. Marriages were arranged by the father or oldest male member of a family.
 3. Girl babies were treasured more than boy babies.
 4. Selling girls into slavery was a relatively common practice.
 5. Husband and wife shared equally in household and field duty.
 6. Having a concubine was culturally acceptable during this era.
 7. Prostitution was illegal in China during this era.
 8. Famine, starvation, and death were rampant, especially among peasant farmers.
 9. Infanticide was an accepted practice.
 10. Most elderly people had to be cared for by the government.
 11. In large cities, rich people often lived behind almost impenetrable walls.

- 1. Identify Wang Lung and O-lan.
- 2. *Summarize Wang Lung's wedding day. Will O-lan find her life pleasing?

Chapters 2 & 3, pp. 25-38

- 1. *How does Wang Lung know O-lan likes him? What reveals his pleasure in her?
- 2. *How does O-lan react when Wang Lung mentions the great house? What does this imply?
- 3. What does O-lan ask of Wang Lung and why?

Chapters 4 & 5, pp. 39-53

- 1. What does Wang Lung do in honor of his son's birth? What frightens him and how does he react?
- 2. *Contrast O-lan and the wife of Wang Lung's uncle. Do you know women who fit both descriptions? Without identifying individuals, explain your answer.
- 3. Why do Wang Lung and his family stay at home instead of visiting people like others in the village?

Chapters 6 & 7, pp. 54-66

- 1. Explain Wang Lung's mixed feelings about buying land from the House of Hwang. What does he determine to do?
- 2. *How does Wang Lung initially react to O-lan's second pregnancy? Why do you think he reacts this way?
- 3 Explain the events surrounding the birth of the second child.
- 4. How does the wife of Wang Lung's uncle manipulate Wang Lung?

Chapter 8, pp. 67-75

- 1. Explain what is happening in the House of Hwang.
- 2. Explain the effects of the drought on Wang Lung's family and others.
- 3. What do the villagers attempt to do? Why? What stops them?


Chapters 9 & 10, pp. 76-92
