

- 1. Write down your first impressions of Bigger and his family.
- 2. According to Bigger's mother, why has Bigger taken a job?
- 3. Why is Bigger afraid to rob Mr. Blum's store?
- 4. What would Bigger like to be? Why hasn't he gone into that career?
- 5. Find two examples of Bigger's capacity for violence.
- 6. Bigger goes to the movies. What is the contrast between the newsreel and the movie?
- *7. Why do you think Bigger enjoys "playing white" with Gus?
- **8. How will Bigger get along with Mary? Will he tell her that he already saw her in the newsreel?

- 1. Why does Bigger find himself staring at Mrs. Dalton?
- 2. When Mr. Dalton hires Bigger as chauffeur, does he know that Bigger has been in trouble with the law?
- 3. How does Mary embarrass Bigger when she first meets him?
- 4. What does Peggy show Bigger how to do?
- 5. Why doesn't Bigger drive Mary where Mr. Dalton originally told him he would be taking her?
- 6. How does Bigger kill Mary and dispose of the body?
- *7. Why does Bigger kill Mary? Why doesn't he just tell Mrs. Dalton the truth about why he is in Mary's room?
- **8. How will Mary's death be uncovered? Will Bigger be a suspect?

- 1. Why does Bigger throw away the purse but keep the Communist pamphlets?
- 2. How does Buddy know that Bigger is in some kind of trouble?
- 3. When do the Daltons start to worry about Mary?

- 6. What does Bessie want Bigger to tell her?
- * 7. How does Bigger feel about having murdered Mary? What does it mean, "He had murdered and had created a new life for himself. It was something that was all his own..."?
