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**Directions: (A)** In small group talk about the relationships between the characters below. Label each arrow with a brief description of the relationship.



(B) Write an essay analyzing one of the relationships you have discussed. How do the two get along? What is the history of their relationship? What contributes to tensions between these two? jealousy? revenge? pride? different principles? Does the nature of the relationship change during the course of the play?

(C) Laius is dead when the story begins, but we learn about him through characters' comments in *Oedipus the King*. Compare and contrast Oedipus and Laius in class discussion. How are they similar and how are they different? in temperament? in their relationship with Jocasta? with the people they rule? with their offspring? in their motivations? Fill in the Venn diagram, below.



**Directions:** Many of the characters and events in *Oedipus the King* have modern-day counterparts—in life, fiction, or art. In the chart below, briefly list and explain links between themes in *Oedipus the King* and in the present-day world.

For instance, do you see a similarity between Sophocles' Chorus and today's media? Does the tragedy of Oedipus—whose search for the "truth" of his birth ends on a dark note—remind you of any recent movies you have seen or songs you have heard? (If you're feeling creative, draw a cartoon that captures the Oedipus-like nature of the present-day situation.)
