

- 1. Where is Oliver Twist born? What information is given about his mother?
- 2. *Where is Oliver sent when he is about ten months old? Why is he sent there? What is your reaction to the living conditions of the children?
- 3. Briefly describe Oliver on his ninth birthday. What happens to him at this time?
- 4. *Identify Mrs. Mann and Mr. Bumble and explain their roles in Oliver's life. How would you feel about being under their care?
- 5. What decision does the parish board make about Oliver? How does he react to this change?
- 6. How is Oliver treated in the workhouse? Why does he get in trouble? What is his punishment?
- 7. *Identify and briefly describe the first man who offers to take Oliver. What saves him from this man? What do you think would have happened if Oliver had been apprenticed to him?
- 8. To whom is Oliver apprenticed? What is this man's occupation? How does Oliver react?
- 9. *Prediction: How will Oliver fare as Mr. Sowerberry's apprentice?


Chapters 5-8, pp. 33-66

- 2. *What circumstances surround Oliver's first funeral experience? How does he react? What do you think Dickens' purpose is in including this scene?
- 3. *Why does Oliver attack Noah? How does Noah react? What do you think this reveals about both of them?
- 4. How does each of the following react to Oliver's outburst: Mrs. Sowerberry, Mr. Bumble, and Mr. Sowerberry?
- 5. *What does Oliver do after Mr. Sowerberry beats him? What would you have done?
- 6. How does Oliver plan to get to London? How is he treated on his journey?
- 7. Whom does Oliver meet in Barnet? What is the result of this meeting?
- 8. Briefly describe Fagin and explain his purpose.
