Directions: Write a brief answer to each question as you read the novel at home or in class. Use the questions to guide your reading and prepare for class discussion.



- Play continues in this manner until all cards have been read.




A Single Shard Activity #13 • Critical Thinking Use After Reading

Cause and Effect

A **cause** is an action that makes things happen. **Effects** are the things that happen. The effects are directly related to the cause.

Write Tree-ear's name in the top rectangle labeled "Cause." Think about the story and fill in each rectangle below with an effect Tree-ear caused.

Example: Because Tree-ear touched and broke the rectangle vase, he began working for Min.


