Biography

Ernest Hemingway was known as being a "man's man"—one who loved hard-hitting sports and adventures. He was also a devoted father and a meticulous writer. During his writing career, he earned the title "The Voice of the Lost Generation," and also created the "Hemingway hero" or "Hemingway code."


- 1. Who is introduced at the beginning of the section?
