- 5. *Identify two examples of sweetness and gentleness in the story "Spin." Which do you find the most touching? Why?
- 6. *Activity: Write a metaphor or simile poem based on the statement, "Stories are for eternity."


Sorting Characters

Directions: Similarities among characters are sometimes a clue to themes in the story. Place the book's characters in one or more of the groups below.


