



Sociogram



Feelings


Directions: Choose a character from the book and complete the chart below.



Understanding Values

Values represent people's beliefs about what is important, good, or worthwhile. For example, most families consider spending time together as something valuable.

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Conflict

The **conflict** of a story is the struggle between two people or two forces. There are three main types of conflict: person vs. person, person vs. nature or society, and person vs. self.
