




### **Characterization of Viola**

3. Introduces the main characters


Rising Action: Reveals successive stages of conflict or complications

Climax: Turning point of story (the crisis; when complications begin to unravel)

Falling Action: Leads logically to a resolution of the conflict or the unraveling of the

complications

Denouement: Resolution: solution, explanation, outcome
