



Understanding Values

Directions: Think about the following characters from *A Year Down Yonder* and the values they have: Grandma Dowdel, Mary Alice, Mrs. Weidenbach, Mildred Burdick, Carleen Lovejoy, Arnold Green. What do they value? What beliefs do they have about what is important, good, or worthwhile?

Create a Pop-Up Book

Directions: Choose three scenes from the story to illustrate in a pop-up book. Scenes that have motion or action make the best pop-ups. You will need three sheets of construction paper (use 8.5" X 14" paper for more writing space).

1. Fold a piece of construction paper in half horizontally.

2. Along the folded edge, cut two slits of equal length for each of the pop-up tabs in your scene.

3. Open the paper up, and pull each of the pop-up tabs forward.

4. Fold the paper again so that each of the pop-up tabs is in the center of the paper. Press the base of each tab so that it forms a crease.

5. Open up your paper and draw the background of your scene.

6. For each tab, draw and cut out a figure(s) on a separate sheet of paper. Glue the figure(s) to the tabs so that they will pop up.

7. Write a sentence about the scene under your illustration. Repeat steps 1 through 6 for each page.

8. When the pages are complete, glue the bottom of one page to the top of the next, until all of the pages are joined.

9. Use another sheet of construction paper and fold it in half. This will be the cover to your book. Glue this paper to your sheets. Use decorative lettering to write the name of the book and the author's name. Be sure to include your name on the cover as the illustrator.
