

Pre-reading Setting History

Objective: Researching life in England during Orwell's time.

Activity:

George Orwell lived and wrote in Great Britain during the first half of the twentieth century. A thorough understanding of life in England during Orwell's lifetime provides insight into the subject matter of 1984 and enables readers to view and evaluate Orwell's ideas and vision within the context of the political, cultural, and social landscape of his time.

Using the library, the Internet, or both, research the history and find information to fill in the next chart, which deals with Great Britain between 1900 and 1955.

Part One – Chapter I Oxymoron

Objective: Recognizing and understanding the significance of

oxymora as powerful rhetorical devices.

The manipulation of language plays a major role in the setup and organization of the Oceanian society described in 1984. The Oceanian government is in the process of replacing Standard English with the artificial language Newspeak. In addition to the development of a new language, several rhetorical devices are prevalent in the language used in Oceania. In naming the four ministries that constitute the government, Oceanian officials frequently employed oxymoron.

Activity I:

Collect examples of oxymora. Some may come to mind immediately; others can be found in newspaper or magazine articles, books, speeches, movie titles, etc. Remember, a term like "sounds of silence" would be considered a paradox, oxymora are usually just two words.
