Objectives: Understanding how character is developed in the novel Discussing the relationship between characters in the novel

Characterization II

Objectives: Relating literature to life Weighing the truth and/or significance of a character's assertions

Activity

When people reflect having experienced success or failure, the question of luck surfaces. Is success the result of good luck and failure the result of bad luck? One way the old man passes time is to reflect on luck. Hemingway writes,

"Only I have no luck any more. But who knows? Maybe today. Every day is a new day. It is better to be lucky. But I would rather be exact. Then when luck comes you are ready."

In small groups, discuss your views on the old man's luck. Use the **Luck versus Skill** chart to take notes on whether it is luck or skill the old man depends on. Find supporting examples from the book to make your conclusions stronger.

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Figurative Language

Objective: Understanding how figurative language enhances meaning

Activity

Hemingway's style of writing is to use both concrete images and figurative language to communicate his ideas. For example, in his description of the old man's hands, he says,

"...his hands had the deep-creased scars from handling heavy fish on the cords. But none of these scars were fresh. They were as old as erosions in a fishless desert."

The *topic* of this simile is the *deep scars* on the man's hands. The image Hemingway uses to make the reader understand how the scars look is "erosions in a fishless desert." The scars are *similar* to erosions in a desert; they are deep cracks in a dry surface, and they are very old scars. The *impression* the reader gets is one of old age, work, fights with fish, and an understanding that the old man has not battled a fish for a very long time.
