Symbolism

Writing/Drama

Objectives: Creating a scene from provided information

Composing words and thoughts from different characters' point of views

Performing a dialogue in front of an audience

Activity

Here's the situation: Andy has stumbled upon Keisha's diary. It is open to the current date, March 9th. Andy cannot resist; he reads Keisha's diary and is astounded at what she has written. Later on that day, Andy feels that he must call Keisha to discuss her thoughts. He knows she may become angry with him, but he must speak with her about the diary entry.

Will Andy ask her about the diary directly, or will he chat meaninglessly for a while? Will Keisha become angry, or will she be compassionate when she hears Andy's feelings? Is Andy angry about the diary entry, or does Keisha know exactly how Andy thinks?

Re-read the phone conversation between Keisha and Andy on pages 97 - 100 as an example. Note that quotation marks are unnecessary because entire phone conversations are spoken. Characters take turns speaking, and each comment begins with a dash (—). Because telephone conversations are largely informal, it is okay to use slang as well as incomplete sentences to make the conversation more realistic. Here is a sample beginning of what your conversation might look like:

- —Hello, is Keisha there?
- —What's up, Keisha?
- —Oh, nothin' much. Just watchin' some T.V. What're you up to tonight?
- —Just thinkin' 'bout you, sweetie. It's our five-month anniversary, ya know.
- —Yeah, what of it?
- —Nevermind. Look, I've gotta ask ya about somethin'...

When you are finished, take turns reading your conversations for the class. Pretend you are the characters and speak with feeling and emotion.

Writing a Will

Objectives: Writing a will to expressing a character's wishes

Writing using formal Standard English using correct grammar, mechanics, and usage

Activity

On the night of April 2nd, Andy makes desperate phone calls to Dr. Carrothers, Coach Ripley, and Keisha, but does not get to talk to anyone. The next day, Andy leaves for school, but returns home and commits suicide.

Your task is to write a will for Andy. It will be read aloud a few days after Andy's funeral. The purpose of a will is to distribute personal belongings, like money or material possessions and to express one's final wishes and thoughts. Here are some ideas that might be appropriate for Andy's will:

- What would Andy want his loved ones and the world to know?
- Why did he commit suicide? What was he thinking?
- What would he want to tell Monty? His mother? His father? Keisha? His friends?
- Would he leave any advice for anyone?
- Would he divide his possessions? You know enough about Andy's character to create the types of possessions he would have had. For example, would he leave his basketball to Monty?

Write in first person, from Andy's point of view. Wills should be about one page in length. Do not forget to revise and/or proofread to reduce grammatical errors. Use the following line as your beginning:

"I, Andrew Jackson, declare this to be my last will...."

Writing a Scene

Objectives: Creating fictional events based on facts

Writing dialogue for characters

Activity

What would you have liked to happen differently in *Tears of a Tiger*? Could the novel have had a different ending just by adding one scene? Now is your chance to change history. Choose one of the four suggested scenes below or ask your teacher to approve an idea for a scene of your own. There are endless possibilities for this extra scene.

- Keisha and Andy just before his death
- Andy and Rob's mother at the hospital
- Andy's coach and Andy's dad
- Andy and Rob after Andy's death

You will need to write dialogue for each character that remains true to each character. Remember to write using a conversational style. Scenes should range from two to four pages in length. After creating your scene, write one short paragraph explaining how this new scene could have changed the novel. Share your scene with the class and have class members describe how the novel would be different.
