



Origami Swan




1. Cut a piece of paper into a square. Fold the square in half to make two triangles.




2. Unfold the square.



3. Fold in the right- and left-hand corners to the center.




4. Flip it over.




5. Fold in the right-and left-hand corners to the center.




6. Fold up the bottom point to the top point.




7. Fold down the swan's head.




8. Fold back the sides.



9. Pull up the swan's neck.



10. Pull out the swan's bill.



11. Pull up the swan's head.

Book Report Ideas


After you have finished *The Summer of the Swans*, work in a small group to complete one of the following activities.

• Mural
